
Chat GPT & Writing Assignments

We Can't Out-Prompt It



We Can't Count on Detecting It

It may be more difficult to distinguish AI prose from student writing
AI is not good at mimicking styles of developing writers or variants in standard English.
Being attentive to error-free pieces can help detect if prose was created with AI, you can detect shifts in student's writing
Since there is no detector for AI writing, focus on the steps that you can take to swerve the use of this in your classroom

Focus on Motivation and the Writing Process



Assign writing that is interesting and meaningful as possible to students

Communicate the value of the writing process while supporting the process as much as possible- break it down step by step

Focus on building relationships with students as a way to help them to stay engaged



Explore the Nature and Risks of Al with Students

Don't Wait to Feel like an Expert

Learn about AI in class alongside your students, it is evolving too fast. Approaching AI with a greater sense of inquiring together introduces it in a way that can prevent misuse.

Expect Emotional Responses to Al

Humans can tend to attribute human qualities to computer systems, this is known as the Eliza effect. Discussing emotions that AI evokes is important for mental-health challenged individuals.

Teach Students to be on the Lookout
